# FOUND IN THE ARCHIVES: BESSIE AND JESSIE

The things that turn up in the archives never cease to amaze me. And often in the place least expected. I was looking for some information about the decision to build the Caird Hall in the Town Clerk's subject files. File 253 contains accounts, minutes and correspondence relating to the purchasing of property for the Central Improvement Scheme. As the Corporation had bought a number of properties they now found themselves as landlords to a number of tenants. This is the story of two of those tenants – Jessie Moir and Bessie Young.

The first letter was from Bessie Young. Bessie tells us that she is a tenant grocer at 4 Greenmarket, having just taken up the lease. She started the business to support her family after her father died. She is appealing to the Council to give her some means of compensation so that she can take out another lease elsewhere in the city. We can confirm from the valuation roll that Bessie only took up the lease of the property in 1913/4. At the time she lived at 166 Perth Road with her step mother Elizabeth Young. From the 1911 census we know that Bessie would have been around 38 at the time of writing the letter and had previously worked as a bookkeeper. (I think this comes across in her letter as she seems very clued up with the money!) Her father Alexander Young, a joiner, died in 1912. The family, including Bessie's 7 half-siblings, lived at 9 Aberlemno Terrace, Perth Road. It seems that they briefly moved to Birkhill where her step mother leased a Grocers shop in 1913. This lasted less than a year as they had moved back to Perth Road and Bessie took out the lease for her own shop. The property was vacated and eventually demolished to make way for the Caird Hall development. She disappears from the valuation roll in 1915 and no trace of her can be found in the Dundee Directories. Perhaps she went back to bookkeeping. We

don't know if she received any compensation from the Council and there is no reply in the file. What happened to Bessie?



The next letter is of a very different tone. It comes from Miss Jessie Moir of 37 High Street. From a little bit of research we know Jessie was born in the late 1860s and lived with her brother Edward, a wine merchant, and his wife Christina. When Edward died in 1907 Jessie and Christina moved to the High Street. With Edward dead, the two women had to support themselves and Christina's children. So they started a dressmakers shop. Jessie describes the building as being "very superior" and they presumably had a refined clientele. Her letter complains about her new upstairs neighbour - John Sime. John was the secretary for the Jute and Flax Union - a growing union for the many thousands of Mill Workers, including many Dundee women. Obviously these were not the women patronise Jessie's dressmaking services. Jessie complains about "the type of people" traipsing up and down the stairs, accusing them of "smelling of drink and the mills, spitting all over". The women she describes as "shawly women" causing a "perfect pandemonium" forcing Jessie to keep two ladies indoors until after it was over. She then threatens to leave the premises if this is not sorted out. I can just imagine Jessie sitting in her complaining about the loiterers on her stair and seething about her new neighbour. She eventually moved out of 37 High Street in 1917 to 1 South Tay Street. She died in 1932 at 11 Oxford Street, leaving £1400 (almost £90,000 today) to her Niece Margaret Grant nee Moir.

# **SWEETS FOR THE SOLDIERS**

"At the outbreak of war, the fisher girls, who had worked with the herring fleet, found themselves out of work. Two thousand of them were offered work in Dundee, mainly in the textile industry but also elsewhere. In 1916, some of them were employed in the Keiller's Factory packing sweets for the troops. Obviously, rank was important as it was Ceylon Toffees and Chocolate Gingers for the officers and boiled sweets and Ju-Jubes for the common soldiers."



# AN AMUSING EPITAPH (ALLEGEDLY FROM THE HOWFF)

Spotted In Dundee Delineated (1822):

"On Mr Alex Speid

Time Flies with speed. With speed Speids fled

To the Dark Regions of the dead

With Speed Consumptions Sorrows flew

And stopt Speids speed for Speid it slew

Miss Speid beheld with Frantic Woe

Poor Speid with Speed turn pale as Snow

And beat her breast and tore her hair

For Speid, Poor Speid was all her care

Lets learn of Speid with Speid to flee

From Sin since we like Speid must die"

### THE COST OF DOING BUSINESS:

In the Wright Trade Scroll Book for 1804 there is an entry showing that a Free Master being a stranger in the burgh had to pay £31 10s for the right to practice is trade in Dundee. This equates to about £2,500 today. He also had to give ten shillings to the trades Gin Fund.

# FOUND BY RICHARD CULLEN IN THE WEDDERBURN PAPERS:

"Weight of a stone taken from Sir Walter Ogilvy forty-three ounces or three pounds seven ounces apothecary weight."

Signed by H. Earle and dated 23<sup>rd</sup> August 1808.
