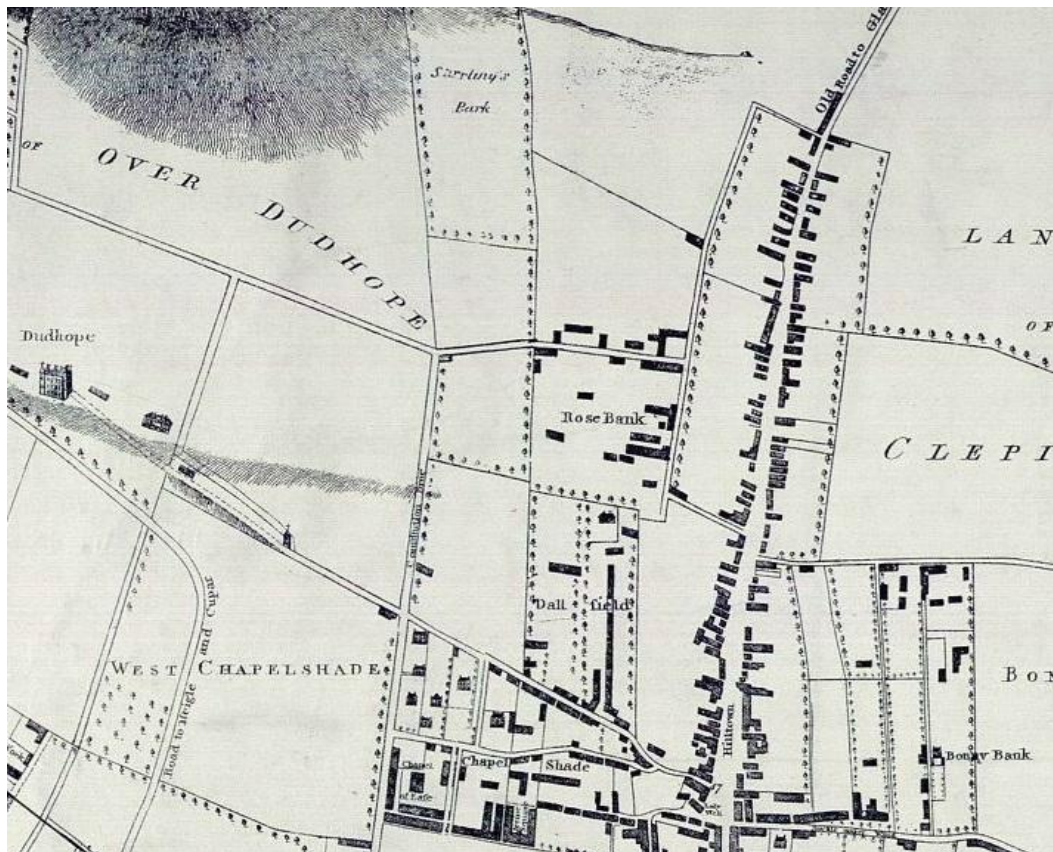


# Index to the Hilltown Chartulary 1700-1819

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## The Hilltown Barony

The Hilltown was created a burgh of barony in 1643 for viscount Dudhope, and thereafter an administration, with bailies and tolbooth, was created. The bailies maintained the rights and rules of the barony and enforced decisions of the barony court. Surviving records of grants of land within the barony prior to 1700 are either in the general register of sasines or particular registers of sasines for Forfarshire, or as precepts and confirmations within gifts and deposits in the custody of the National Records of Scotland. In the 18<sup>th</sup> century the barony included not only the Hilltown we think of today, but also lands such as Coldside, Backside, Easter and Wester Clepington, Forebank, and a number of acres feued to the guildry and town church, and also lands mortified (donated by a will) for the upkeep of certain groups such as poor seamen or widows.

The burgh of Dundee purchased the barony of the Hilltown in 1697, from which time the provost, council and trades of the burgh of Dundee became the superiors and had the right to appoint the Hilltown bailies. Anyone succeeding to, or purchasing lands or houses in the Hilltown, was required, theoretically at least, to obtain charters of confirmation and precepts of *clare constat* from Dundee burgh council. Property owners paid an annual *feu* duty to the superiors and were liable to attend the barony court if and when required. In 1700 the council of Dundee began keeping a chartulary - or register of charters - as a record of all such grants made within the Hilltown barony. The Dundee burgh council minutes also record the appointment of bailies for the Hilltown, and, in theory at least, a note of when charters were issued for Hilltown properties.

When one person bought a piece of land in the Hilltown from another, the seller issued a *disposition* which confirmed a sale had taken place, that payment had been made, and that the seller had now *disponed* ('disposed') the land to the buyer. The new owner took his or her *disposition* to the *superior* (to whom a yearly *feu* was due) and obtained a charter of confirmation by which the *superior* acknowledged that a change of ownership had taken place. A bailie was then appointed who took the new owner to the land, together with their disposition and charter of confirmation as evidence, and then gave earth and stone into the hands of the owner to symbolise that actual possession had been transferred – the process of *seising*. The document recording this stage – the *sasine* ('say-zeen') – was usually recorded in either a shire register, or a general register in Edinburgh.

Whenever a property owner died the heir – usually a son or daughter, but also more distant relatives – came forward to claim the property. A jury of local men who knew the deceased and his or her family was convened and was known as an *inquisition*. This body then formally recorded its judgment that the new owner was indeed the rightful heir and issued a *retour* ('return') which the new owner took to the *superior*. The *superior* having seen the *retour* then issued a *precept of clare constat* acknowledging that 'it is clearly established' (from the Latin *clare constat*) that the new owner was the heir. The superior then issued a new charter of confirmation which the owner took to the property and received *sasine* from a bailie.

## Description of the Records

The register is entitled *Charters of Confirmation and Precepts of Clare Constat granted by the Magistrates, Town Council and Trades of Dundee to the Fewars in the Hilltown, etc, Dundee*. There are indexes at the back of each individual volume which record, in order of granting, the type of charter, and to whom granted, though designations, places of residence or names of spouses are not included. During the 19<sup>th</sup> century an attempt was made to add alphabetical indexes by surname. The six volumes of the chartulary, now in the custody of Dundee City Archives, are as follows:

### **Vol 1: 1 February 1700 – 11 August 1718**

The documents in this volume are all written in Latin. 258 pages

### **Vol 2: 25 September 1718 – 16 July 1737**

The documents are written in Latin until November 1732 when they change over to English, with the qualification that the English texts are interspersed with a number of spellings and words from the Scots language. 266 pages

### **Vol 3: 14 September 1737 – 17 September 1766**

The documents are written in English, interspersed with Scots. This volume was less well kept between 1759 and 1765 with the consequence that several charters were left unfinished and undated, and, we may suspect, some acts never written up. 277 pages

### **Vol 4: 1 January 1767- 2 April 1782**

The documents are written in English, interspersed with Scots. 259 pages

### **Vol 5: 25 May 1782- 20 May 1799**

The documents are written in English, interspersed with Scots. 250 pages

### **Vol 6: 1 August 1800 – 20 April 1819**

The documents are written in English, interspersed with Scots. From 1813 the number of charters recorded began to trail off. The documents in this volume are numbered by folio rather than page. 165 folios

## Abbreviations used in the index

The index which follows is an alphabetical surname index of persons who received confirmations or grants to property within the barony of the Hilltown between the years 1700 and 1819. Details of occupations and places of residence have also been included. Where husbands and wives were joint grantees they have been indexed individually. The following abbreviations are used:

### **C**

Charter (feu charter) granted by Dundee council to a new grantee (known as a feuar or vassal) who paid a yearly feu duty in return. In the case of the Hilltown the feu duty was generally paid in coin at two terms of the year together with some poultry.

### **CA**

Charter of Alienation. Document transferring the title to a piece of land or estate from one person to another.

### **CC**

Charter of Confirmation. When one person sold property in the Hilltown to another a charter was required from Dundee council as superior confirming that a transfer of ownership had taken place.

### **CR**

Charter of Resignation. When an individual wished to resign property rights back to the superior, paving the way for a new re-grant - either to themselves under new conditions or to a new owner - they issued a charter of resignation.

### **DAD**

Decreet of Adjudication. When a property owner ran into debt, or became bankrupt, often their land was seized and sold in satisfaction for paying their debts. A decreet (or decree) of adjudication enforced the decision of the court.

### **DDR**

Decreet of declator and reduction. A legal decree that a certain right had been set aside or annulled.

### **PCC**

Precept of Clare Constat. When an individual property owner died and was succeeded by a relative, the superior (here, Dundee council) issued a *precept of clare constat* (Latin for 'it is clearly established') which acknowledged that the relative claiming to succeed was the legitimate heir.

## **1759x65**

This means that the document is undated but was evidently granted between the years 1759 and 1765.

### **Abbreviations of Personal Names**

Due to the constraints of space, occasionally some personal names have been abbreviated, such as Eliz (Elizabeth), Ja (James), Wm (William). These will hopefully be apparent to the reader.

### **Abbreviations of Relationships**

The relationships of those related to the main grantee in the index have been abbreviated, such as bro (brother of), dau (daughter of), grd (grandchild of), ser (servant of), sis (sister of), son (son of), sp (spouse of), wid (widow of – in the original text generally the Scots word *relict* is used).

For example an entry that reads 'Constable, Barbara, dau. William C, burgess Dundee' should be read as 'Barbara Constable, daughter of William Constable burgess of Dundee'. Another example is 'Brown, John, dyer Glasgow, bro. David B weaver' which should be read as 'John Brown dyer in Glasgow, brother of David Brown, weaver.' One last example is 'Low, Margaret, sp. John Tosh, sis. John Low, baker', which should be read as 'Margaret Low, spouse of John Tosh, and sister of John Low, baker.'

### **Place-names**

Place-names have generally been given in the forms they appear within the original text. Due to constraints of space some names have occasionally been abbreviated, such as Ddee (Dundee), Glsgw (Glasgow) or Edin (Edinburgh), for example.

### **Surnames**

Rather than attempt to standardise surnames I have generally reproduced them as they appear in the original, reflecting the variation of forms and spellings. This means that the following variants will be found indexed: Broun/Brown, Clarke/Clerk, Gib/Gibb, Hog/Hogg, Man/Mann, Nicol/Nicole/Nicoll, Ogilvie/Ogilvy, Rait/Raitt, Richie/Ritchie, Smith/Smyth and White/Whyte.

A number of surnames appear in their distinct Scots language form, such as Baisler (Batchelor), Dreden (Dryden), Dukatt (probably Duguid), Foord (Ford), Ketnis (Caithness), Fleeming (Fleming), Smale (Small), Yeaman (Yeoman) *etc.*
